Join the 'Land for Wildlife' scheme

The Land for Wildlife (LFW) program is a voluntary property registration scheme for landowners who wish to manage areas for biodiversity and wildlife habitat.

Land for Wildlife encourages and assists landholders to include nature conservation along with other land management objectives.

Land for Wildlife is free to join and is not legally binding. Registration in the scheme will not change the legal status of a property.



Brunswick Valley Landcare are pleased to announce they have taken on the regional provision of the Land for Wildlife scheme for Byron Shire.

Who is eligible?

Land for Wildlife welcomes landholders who:

- Have a property with at half a hectare or more of native bush land,
- Are willing to manage part or all of their property in an environmental sustainable way,

A "working towards" registration category is available to landholders who do not qualify for full registration at the first property visit.

Benefits of joining LFW


- There is no cost and the title of the property is not affected
- Registration puts landholders in touch with like minded people and to receive useful information or invitations to workshops


Landholders who qualify for registration receive:





Biodiversity Conservation Act and amended Local Land Services Act

The NSW Government has released a new draft Biodiversity Conservation Bill, a Local Land Services Amendment Bill, and information about proposed land clearing codes. The legislative package is designed to replace the Native Vegetation Act, Threatened Species Conservation Act, the Nature Conservation Trust Act and parts of the National Parks & Wildlife Act. The package will be on public exhibition for the next eight weeks, and submissions close on **Tuesday 28 June 2016**.

Landcare NSW has secured funding to run information sessions on the draft and its ramifications, with representatives from NSW EDO, Nature Conservation Council, NSW Farmers and other interested groups. A session will be held in Grafton at a date to be notified. We'll keep you posted.

Another workshop run by the EDO will also be held in the Tweed.

Restoring Catchments and Coastal Wetlands of the Great Barrier Reef (Qld)

The iconic Great Barrier Reef, Australia's most celebrated natural wonder relies on healthy catchments and coastal wetlands. In December 2015 the Reef, its catchments and wetlands received a major boost with the announcement of a \$4 million restoration initiative. Conservation Volunteers and their new partner organization WetlandCare Australia will be working with Greening Australia and Birdlife Australia to deliver a 200 hectare project of on-ground catchment and coastal wetland restoration works, restoring key habitats to improve water quality in the Great Barrier Reef region. The project will be implementing science based methods to protect threatened species habitats and maintain biodiversity.

Global wild tiger population increases, but still a long way

The number of tigers in the wild has risen for the first time in 100 years, marking a major turning point in the big cat's plight against poaching and habitat loss.

Data estimates 3,890 tigers living in wild across the world.

This number is up almost 700 animals from 2010 figure.

WWF welcomes increase but says more still needs to be done.



Figures collated from national surveys conducted in tiger range states and from the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN), estimate the number of tigers living in the wild to be at 3,890.

That is up almost 700 animals from the 2010 figure, which estimated the population at 3,200.

The World Wildlife Fund (WWF) Australia's national manager for species, Darren Grover, welcomed the news, saying it was the first increase since the turn of the twentieth century.

"That's great news. It's the first positive trend for wild tiger populations in more than 100 years," he said. In 1900, approximately 100,000 tigers were estimated to be living in the wild.

"In those 100 years or so we've lost around 97 per cent of wild tigers," Mr Grover said.

Dutch government ordered to cut carbon emissions in landmark ruling

Back in June last year a Dutch court ordered state to reduce emissions by 25% within five years to protect its citizens from climate change in world's first climate liability suit

To cheers and hoots from climate campaigners in court, three judges ruled that government plans to cut emissions by just 14-17% compared to 1990 levels by 2020 were unlawful, given the scale of the threat posed by climate change.

"Before this judgement, the only legal obligations on states were those they agreed among themselves in international treaties," said Dennis van Berkel, legal counsel for Urgenda, the group that brought the suit.

"This is the first a time a court has determined that states have an independent legal obligation towards their citizens. "

Hand in hand - riparian restoration, farming and tourism

Brunswick Valley Landcare and The Farm Byron Bay are collaborating to plant over 2000 trees along the eastern headwaters of Simpsons Creek, Ewingsdale.

Peter Ryan, Brunswick Valley Landcare President said "It's great to form a partnership with The Farm and to demonstrate how looking after biodiversity and water quality can be done alongside agriculture and tourism."

The project is supported by North Coast Local Land Services, through funding from the National Landcare Programme.

Simpsons Creek is a tributary of the Brunswick River and home to a wide variety of species. A history of land clearing and unrestricted access of cattle to the creek has caused severe degradation in sections.



Planting native species, controlling weeds and fencing the project area to restrict cattle access will



help reverse the degradation, encourage a diversity of wildlife, reduce erosion and improve water health. Restoring the headwaters will limit further weed infestations downstream.

Tom Lane, owner of The Farm says "We are so fortunate to be partnering with Brunswick Valley Landcare and North Coast Local Land Services to provide a showcase of how land regeneration and farming can work in symbiosis. We hope this encourages others to follow."



The area will be planted and maintained without the use of chemicals, consistent with The Farm's policies. Grass weeds will be controlled with black plastic, which will smother the grasses and heat the soil preventing germination of seeds.

Peter Ryan added, "I look forward to watching the plantings grow and both humans and wildlife being able to use and appreciate this area in the future."

Glyphosate: Clarifying the Facts

Concerns have been raised about human exposure to the common herbicide glyphosate, following an International Agency for Research on Cancer (IARC) assessment which has classified glyphosate in a group of chemicals that is 'probably carcinogenic to humans'.

The Australian Pesticides and Veterinary Medicines Authority has recently updated its website information about using glyphosate. This update provides chemical users, growers and home gardeners with more information about the safe use of products containing glyphosate. Read more here: http://apvma.gov.au/node/13891

It also explains the processes underway, both in Australia and internationally, to assess the findings made by the International Agency for Research on Cancer in 2015—results of these assessments are expected in mid 2016.

Weed of the Month

This month's weed of the month is the Fishbone Fern *Nephrolepis cordifolia (Nephrolepis auriculata (L.) Trimen.* This plant is actually local to the inland areas of this region but is usually found living in amongst rocks on rainforest edges.

When it is taken out of its natural range it has become very invasive forming dense mats of foliage which prevents any other native ground covers from colonising the area. The root system spreads effectively to seal off the soil surface and reduce the penetration of rainwater.

The fern has an underground stem densely covered with pale brown scales. The above ground stems are slender and wiry. It has rounded tubers just below surface. The ferns fronds are erect or hang downwards and the leaves are dull lime green and narrow, often with a row of pale dots on the upper surface near the leaf margin.

It has spores all year round and germinates from these spores and is also distributed from dumped garden rubbish.

Similar Native Species are *Pellaea falcata*, Sickle Fern has hairy and scaly stems and the pinnae are

dark green above and lighter below (discolorous). *Doodia aspera*, Prickly Rasp Fern has a black scaly stem, and a rough texture to the leaves. The also have a pink flush on the ends of new growth.
