





Control large woody vine weeds workshop

A focus of this project is the control of large woody vine weeds, particularly Cat's Claw Creeper which smothering the riparian vegetation for many years.


Public Exhibition Stage 3 Vegetation Mapping

Closing date extended. Have Your Say: Regional Strategic Weed Management Plan – closing date extended

The North Coast Regional Weed Committee and North Coast Local Land Services have prepared a Regional Strategic Weed Management Plan.

Landcare has been part of the development of the Plan, and is represented on the Regional Weed Committee through Barry Powells of Coffs Harbour Regional Landcare. This is your chance to have your say on the draft plan before it is finalised.

The North Coast Regional Strategic Weed Management Plan will be on public exhibition from **8 February to 29**March 2017.

The purpose of the Plan is to guide weed management in the region. The Plan will help implement the NSW weed reforms, Biosecurity Strategy and Invasive Species Plan in relation to weeds for the North Coast region. The North Coast Regional Strategic Weed

Management Plan builds on past weed planning efforts and is based on the accumulated experience and expert local knowledge of Regional Weed Committee members and their networks. It identifies priority weeds, their management objectives, and the recommended measures that will allow land managers to meet their General Biosecurity Duty.

The Plan is non-regulatory, rather that it prioritises species for management under the Biosecurity Act 2015. As such there are no specific requirements mentioned for control at a regional level. The regulatory control of weeds in our region will remain with the local Control Authorities (Councils) who are responsible for compliance under the Biosecurity Regulations.

Online feedback on the plan can be made from 8 February - 29 March via the North Coast Open website. The North Coast Draft Plan, additional supporting information, and feedback process will be available on North Coast Open from Wednesday 8 February. http://open.lls.nsw.gov.au/nc-weeds

GroNATIVE APP

There's a brand new app <u>GroNATIVE app</u> designed for South East Queenslanders by Natura Pacific, Griffith University and the Queensland Government.

GroNATIVE is a free app designed to help anyone with a bit of space to create a native garden bursting with life. From balcony to back-yard, or from acreage to restoration area, the app provides a purposeful and easy way to make your property look great using native plants.



The tool was co-ordinated, written and compiled by Natura Pacific, designed and coded by Griffith University and funded by the Queensland Government. The first release version 'GroNATIVE South East Queensland' focuses on over 400 plants native to the South East Queensland bioregion that spans the coastal ranges between Gladstone and the New South Wales border at Coolangatta and inland to Toowoomba.

Asian Gecko by Alan Goldstein

Goonengerians are reporting for a few years now the arrival in numbers of the Asian House Gecko. We are wondering how big an issue this is in other parts of the Shire and surrounds.

Please find attached the story of Asian house geckos in Australia. It reflects fundamental ignorance because it was and is not obvious they are having negative impacts, but as Hoskin points out we should be looking, and they have been recorded in the bush away from houses in northern Australia.

We have no more informative information but we keep getting reports of them having invaded houses both up here in the hills and on the coast locally. If they've traveled through the bush to colonize these houses (where they are easily detected) there must be quite a few of them in the matrix surrounding the houses (where they are not easily detected). They would be typically found wood heaps or in rock piles.

It would be interesting for people to look out in their wood heaps and rock piles and on trees by torchlight on warm nights etc. How about a combined land care "spot the gecko competition"?

"Hemidactylus frenatus is an Asian gecko that has spread pantropically to become one the world's most widespread reptiles. It has been established in Australia for approximately 50 years, but the last two decades have seen massive range expansion across settled areas of northern and eastern Australia; and this spread continues at pace. Disturbingly, H. frenatus is increasingly being detected in natural habitats in Australia, in some cases at high densities. Despite rampant spread, there has been little concern regarding the potential impact of this species on native geckos or natural systems more broadly. This is surprising given that Australia is a centre of gecko origin and diversity, and that H. frenatus has had well documented detrimental impacts on geckos in other parts of its introduced range"

STORIES to inspire and give you hope

Successful Habitat Action Grant by Alison Ratcliffe

Twenty six projects were funded in the 2016-2017 Habitat Action Grants. These grants will assist recreational anglers, local Councils, environmental and community groups and private landholders to



enhance and rehabilitate degraded recreational fish habitat through a range of on-ground works. Rehabilitation of fish habitat provides long-term sustainable benefits for native fish stocks and in turn provides substantial benefits for NSW recreational fishers who will enjoy more healthy productive fisheries. Improvements in fish habitat will also provide more opportunities for rural and regional communities to promote local tourism.

"Restoring fish habitat in Marshalls Creek, Brunswick River" was one of the successful grants. The project managed by Brunswick Valley Landcare will carry out weeding, erosion control, and revegetation of coastal forests and wetlands along Marshalls Creek, New Brighton and Ocean Shores. The work will be carried out on land owned by the

Ocean Shores Country Club and Byron Shire Council.

Land for Wildlife

Private Land Conservation Survey



The Foundation for National Parks & Wildlife (FNPW) is a not-for-profit, non-government organisation, established in 1970 with a mission to protect and safeguard Australia's native plants, animals and cultural heritage.

FNPW collaborates with local project partners, working together to gain permanent protection for habitats, grow Australia's National Parks system and to conserve Australia's unique habitats, species, and cultural heritage. FNPW does this in a range of ways including supporting local projects, grants programs and delivering Backyard Buddies - a community environmental education initiative to encourage everyone to do their bit for Australia's unique wildlife.

With over 47 years' experience, FNPW as an environmental and conservation NGO has assisted in protecting and growing 48 National Parks & protected areas across Australia. The Foundation for National Parks & Wildlife and their Project Partners also support landowners to create healthy habitat for species on their own land and since 2008 have awarded 381 Private Land Conservation Grants totalling over \$1.9M. In total, FNPW with our supporters has raised \$60 million for the conservation of Australia's environment.

In late 2016, FNPW was awarded a grant via the LECG program administered by Environmental Trust to support FNPW's "**Nurturing PLC in NSW**" Project. This project aims to highlight both the environmental and social investment made to private land conservation in NSW, the benefits provided by the PLC grant recipients and further promote involvement and engagement to potential private landholders. This project will allow FNPW to share project case studies and success stories, provide information to inspire potential private landholders to engage with FNPW and undertake PLC activities.

To help FNPW gain insight into Private Land Conservation in NSW, and in particular the concept of how PLC can support community engagement and positive social outcomes of being involved, we have launched a survey and encourage all individuals to tell us more about their motivations, challenges and any barriers to participating in PLC.

Foundation for National Parks and Wildlife Private Land Conservation Grants

The Private Land Conservation Grant program from the Foundation for National Parks and Wildlife is due to open very soon. All Land For Wildlife (or other conservation-covenanted properties) should consider applying.



Grant Applications Close: Friday 17 March 2017

One application per property per year is accepted from landholders with one of the following commitments:

Category 1: Conservation Agreement under the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974 or Trust Agreement under the Nature Conservation Trust Act 2001 or In-perpetuity Registered Property Agreement under the Native Vegetation Conservation Act 1997 - Up to \$5,000 a year

Category 2: Conservation Property Vegetation Plan under the Native Vegetation Act 2003 or Wildlife Refuge under the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974 - Up to \$2,000 a year

Category 3a:: Applications for this level are for group Conservation Training and/or Education and can be submitted by Wildlife Land Trust and / or Land for Wildlife members, Land for Wildlife Regional Providers and Trainers / educators on behalf of Wildlife Land Trust and/or Land for Wildlife - Up to \$2,000 a year for training or education proposals

Category 3b: Applications can be submitted by Wildlife Land Trust and / or Land for Wildlife members - Up to \$1,500 a year for on ground works

Cecropia

Have you seen Cecropia plants in your area?

Cecropia (*Cecropia peltata*) is a class 2 noxious weed in the Northern Rivers. It is only present to a limited extent now, but it poses a potentially serious threat to primary production and the environment if it's not controlled now and is allowed to spread.

Trees can grow up to 20m high and often have a wide leafy canopy. The trunk is hollow and ringed with leaf scars, and the fruits are yellow and sausage-shaped.

The very large-lobed leaves make the tree easy to identify – they are 10-60cm wide with 7-11 lobes that have white hairs underneath. The old leaves on the ground can often be the first

thing that you will notice about larger trees as they are a lot larger than most other tree leaves.

Why is it a problem?

Cecropia peltata is native to Central and South America and the West Indies. Our subtropical climate provides an ideal habitat for it to grow and spread. It has invaded forests and roadsides overseas and is listed as one of the global top 100 worst invasive species. Isolated outbreaks have been recorded in increasing numbers here on the Northern Rivers.

Weed of the Month



This month's weed of the month is Climbing Nightshade or Brazilian Nightshade *Solanum seaforthianum*. It originates from the West Indies and is a sprawling perennial shrub or climber. Its leaves are deeply lobed with both surfaces green and hairless except for hairs on margins and veins on lower surface. Flowers are a cluster of 10-50 mauve-blue flowers in Spring and Autumn. It has a bright red berry in Summer to early Winter. It reproduces and spreads through bird dispersed seeds.
