MOOIBAL SPUR COMMUNITY PLANTING

The Mooibal Spur project held a community planting at a Mainarm property on the western border of the project. The planting occured as a direct result of the recent catastrophic flooding. We had a productive and adventurous morning planting Lomandra hysterix into an almost vertical section of collapsed river bank.

The landowner set up a series of ladders and using a hand drill with a planting auger bit the landcare team quickly plugged in 500 healthy Lomandras.

This planting will help to stabilise a landslip and help reduce the possibility of road access being impacted to the landowner's residence plus the Landcare ET project worksite.

Hopefully the bank will remain stable and the planting will help mitigate further collapse.

LITTLE PENGUINS TO BENEFIT FROM CSIRO'S NEW INVASIVE WEED SOLUTION

Little penguins in Victoria will be among the native species to benefit from a new biocontrol solution to tackle the invasive coastal weed 'sea spurge', which will be released in Port Campbell National Park by Australia's national science agency, CSIRO, and Parks Victoria today.

CSIRO researchers have found that the fungus, Venturia paralias, specifically attacks the invasive coastal weed called sea spurge (Euphorbia paralias), which threatens nesting sites of native species including little penguins (Edyptula minor), as well as impacting on the wider coastal ecosystem. Current control methods include removing the weed by hand or chemical sprays.

There is a citizen-science project underway called One Million Turtles. Researchers are encouraging anyone with an interest in conservation to help count turtles using the TurtleSAT mobile phone app. "Across all of Australia there are maybe 10-15 people working on turtles professionally, so we need all the help we can get," Dr Van Dyke said.

REGENERATIVE AGRICULTURE

PILOT SOIL MONITORING AND INCENTIVES PROGRAM



The Australian Government announced a \$54.4 million project over two years to support farmers and land managers to access low-cost soil sampling and certified testing in exchange for sharing their data under the Pilot Soil Monitoring and Incentives Program.

EAL at Southern Cross University has been engaged to deliver the soil testing and monitoring, including arranging soil sampling and testing for land managers who have successfully applied for assistance.

Farmers and land managers may be eligible for benefits of up to \$10,000 and receive assistance from Commonwealth-funded soil extension officers to interpret their soil test results.

The program may assist farmers to gather data for Emissions Reduction Fund projects.

REGENERATIVE AGRICULTURE CAN COMBAT CLIMATE CHANGE AND KEEP FOOD ON OUR PLATES. HERE'S HOW IT WORKS

Last summer, the world's largest french fry producer, McCain Foods, made Canadian headlines when it promised to convert its entire supply chain to regenerative agriculture, an approach to agriculture that promises to sequester carbon and boost biodiversity.

The New Brunswick potato giant is not alone. Over the past decade, the approach has been promoted by a hodgepodge of both small- and large-scale farmers, environmental and social justice advocates, agribusiness CEOs, tech bros, journalists, and academics. It's even received federal support, with Canada's 2030 emissions reduction plan pledging roughly \$1 billion to help farmers adopt regenerative methods.

ARE YOU REPLACING DAMAGED FENCING ON YOUR PROPERTY, OR PLANNING ON INSTALLING NEW FENCING?

When you are fencing in areas next to natural areas with native vegetation on your property or on your neighbours, why not consider installing wildlife friendly fencing?

Areas that native fauna are often found and move through the landscape include: travelling stock reserves, riverbanks/river vegetation, adjoining bushland or reserves, remnant native vegetation on properties or road reserves.

Fauna that are mobile with fur or feathers can often get stuck on barbed wire fencing, causing distress, injury and often death. Keeping our stock contained, while preventing injury to wildlife can be achieved.

To reduce these impacts, simple things such as installing plain wire on top and bottom strands, attaching bright metal or coloured flagging tape or dark piping makes the fencing more friendly (and much easier to see for nocturnal animals).



BYRON BIRD BUDDIES NEWS AND EVENTS

At Belongil a young Beach Stone-curlew turned up a couple of weeks ago to join the three already there - which includes the recently banded I3 (i3), the new kid appears to be younger than I3, a Greyfaced Petrel (we think) found on New Brighton Beach (dead) and a White or Red-tailed Tropicbird (hard to tell) landed on a verandah in Goonengerry and was taken to the Byron Hospital and if oK will be cared for by the people at Seabird Rescue

Unfortunately the Beach Stone-curlew at Brunswick NR lost their egg during the floods of last month - we are watching to see if they lay again

Many of us, searched the environs of the Shire for Glossy Balck-Cockatoo on Saturday - no birds reported by anyone, but lots of casuarinas with cones and only a few chewed and none appeared to be recent. But please everyone keep reporting any sightings of these vulnerable birds for the next 18 months wherever you see them in the Northern Rivers - Evans Head to Tweeda and out to the ranges.

WEED OF THE MONTH Cockspur coral tree Erythring cristg-galli

This nasty weed is extremely adaptive and resilient. It survives prolonged flood inundation, salt water, will grow in all mediums including beach sand! This weed is a serious threat to biodiversity, especially riparian zones and flood plains. Originally cultivated as an ornamental.

How does it spread? Seed

Flowing water moves the pods and seeds. They can also be moved with garden waste.

Plant parts / cuttings

Cut or broken branches can develop roots and form new plants.

These can be spread by dumped garden waste or flood waters.

Control

Physical removal

Hand-pull or dig out small seedlings.

Chemical control

Cut stump method 1:1 Glyphosate + 1g metuslfuron methyl.

Cut trunks or stems and apply herbicide to the stump within 15 seconds of cutting.

Dispose of cut sections or check regularly for sprouting.

Stem injection

Drill, saw or cut with an axe into the sapwood and fill with herbicide within 15 seconds of making the cut. 1:3 glyphosate.

Spraying

There is a permit for spraying but only in the Mid North Coast, Northern Rivers and Far North Coast of NSW. Apply herbicide from October to May by foliar application using knapsack or handgun. Only apply to plants less than 4 m tall or if using a knapsack, only trees less than 1.5 m tall.

1:50 Glyphosate + 1g Metsulfuron Methyl / 10L + surfactant.
