Broken Head Coastal Corridor Restoration 2014 - 2017

The Brunswick Landcare's three year NSW Environmental Trust funded project "Broken Head Coastal Corridor Restoration Project" will be completed in mid August. The project has undertaken restoration on 79 ha over eight adjoining properties at Broken Head which are adjacent to Broken Head Nature Reserve. The project has controlled environmental weeds being mainly Cherry Guava which is the dominant weed invading the high conservation value native vegetation. The project has also included a planting of 1100 plants to link native vegetation, and community and landholder workshops.

The NSW Environmental Trust funds have been used to employ local bush regenerators to undertake the weed control and planting on the properties.

Biosecurity Act launched

The new NSW Biosecurity Act 2015 has now been launched. It replaces 14 outdated Acts with cohesive framework for protecting the State from the threat of diseases, pests, weeds and other contaminants. Under the new Act, everyone has a general biosecurity duty – this means anyone who deals with biosecurity matter is required to prevent, eliminate or minimise any biosecurity risks they encounter.



The new framework is a smarter way of managing biosecurity risks through threat monitoring and management tools, emergency response powers and community education, rather than the old prescriptive regulatory approach. Read the Minister’s media release or visit the NSW DPI Biosecurity website.

Changes to Private Land Conservation in NSW

With the new Biodiversity legislation there will be a roll out of new arrangements for conservation on private lands. Strategic approach to weeds

The impact of weeds on Australian agriculture is estimated to be \$2.5 billion in lost production and \$1.8 billion in control activities every year. Coral trees – going, going, gone forever

Wilsons Creek Huonbrook Landcare celebrates the end of its 3 year Environmental Trust funded Coral Tree Eradication Project.

We live, work and play in the far reaches of the Richmond tributaries of Wilsons and Coopers creeks, west of Mullumbimby. Once, our creeks were lined with patches and tangles of coral trees, which dropped live wood into the creek to be carried by floodwaters way down stream.

Today we believe that coral trees are almost eradicated from our project area, including more than 20 km of creek (but we will continue vigilance and follow up). Although a lot of resources have been required (\$100,000, lots of in-kind and community support), this project is extremely cost-effective. There will be no reinfestation because we work downstream from the extremities of the creeks.

Luckily, we have had very few seed-producing Cockscomb Coral Trees to deal with and our experienced contractors have effectively killed all the wood of the prolific, but non-seed producing, *Erythrina x sykesii*. Natural regeneration of subtropical rainforest species is filling the gaps and we've done some planting too. Huge thanks to all involved!

Land for Wildlife

Foundation for National Parks and Wildlife Grant

The foundation for National Parks and Wildlife recently announced the 2017 recipients of its annual Private Land Conservation Grants program, which is assisted by the NSW Government through its Environmental Trust.

Brunswick Valley Landcare will receive \$5,976 over three years to hold a series of field days in order to give landholders the resources and knowledge to be able to better manage their properties for biodiversity.

Brunswick Valley Landcare have signed up 20 properties since taking on the regional provision of the Land for Wildlife program in Byron Shire in May 2016. Previously, Byron Shire Council had signed up 85 properties to the program, making a total of 105.

Land for Wildlife encourages landholders to manage their properties for biodiversity and wildlife habitat and gives members access to a community of like-minded people. Land for Wildlife members are also eligible to apply for a \$1,500 private land conservation grant from the Foundation for National Parks and Wildlife every year for onground works.

The field days and workshops will focus on topics such as:

- How to attract wildlife to your property, the role of nest boxes - their installation and monitoring,
- Property planning,
- Common weeds and bush regeneration techniques,
- Wildlife corridors and threatened species in our region,
- Riparian restoration and erosion control, wildlife friendly and flood zone fencing,
- Planting 101 – species selection, site preparation, seasonal timing, provenance and genetics.

Regent Honeyeaters by Birdlife Australia



Last year, the Regent Honeyeater Recovery Team was astonished when they heard the news that one of their captive-bred birds—released in the Chiltern-Mt Pilot National Park in north-eastern Victoria—had been seen at Outtrim, in South Gippsland, 270 kilometres away. Now the bird has returned once more to the Chiltern-Mt Pilot National Park, and the mood is jubilant.

You can imagine the excitement when a volunteer participating in the Regent Honeyeater Community Monitoring project recently identified the bird, known as ‘Yellow Yellow’ (named after the combination of colour-coded bands attached to its legs), back in the Chiltern-Mt Pilot National Park once more.

“This 540-kilometre journey sets a new benchmark for the longest confirmed distance travelled by a release bird,” said Dean Ingwersen, BirdLife Australia’s Regent Honeyeater Recovery Co-ordinator.

“Previously, [captive-bred] birds have been sighted up to 100 kilometres from their release site,” he said, “and it’s close to the longest recorded distance between observations of a wild banded bird of almost 600 kilometres travelled.”

“This sighting is so important—it increases the potential for many more released birds to be doing well in areas further afield than we can survey.”

Yellow Yellow, a male Regent Honeyeater, is one of seven captive-bred birds released in 2015 that have been recorded in the wild at least 12 months after they’ve been released. On his return to Chiltern, he was seen courting several female Regent Honeyeaters that had been released into the wild last April.

Yellow Yellow’s journey demonstrates the potential for many more captive-bred birds that have been released into the wild to be out there waiting to be identified. BirdLife Australia requests that everyone keeps an eye out for Regent Honeyeaters, no matter where you are, as the birds tend to move more widely as the weather begins to warm up.

As well as tree sap and other exudates, Leadbeater’s live on small arthropods - like the insect being snapped up here by this youngster.

Leadbeater’s are considered an indicator species. Where they are present, it’s likely you’ll find mature forest nearby that can support other species too. Where Leadbeater’s numbers drop it can be a warning for the wider ecosystem. Read the rest of the story and view the video here

The 2017 NSW Fish Habitat Action Grants



Once again over half a million dollars has been made available through the NSW Recreational Fishing Trusts, with grants up to \$40,000 available.

This is a great opportunity to improve local creek, river, estuaries or surrounding areas to promote healthy waterways and to encourage more fish. Anyone can apply - fishing clubs, community groups, local councils and individuals - as long as the projects are focused on enhancing and rehabilitating degraded fish habitat.

Why not work with a local landholder to improve their riverfront to manage stock and replant native vegetation? It will help the farmer by preventing stock losses and will help the fish by providing water temperature regulation, shelter and food.

Suitable projects include:

- removing invasive weeds and re-establishing native vegetation on our riverbanks;
- restoring and stabilising eroded river banks;
- re-snagging waterways; and
- removing barriers to fish movement by improving road crossings or weirs.

Weed of the Month

This month's weed of the month is Wandering Dew *Tradescantia fluminensis*.

Originating from South America a perennial, prostrate succulent herb with sparse fibrous roots. The stems branch and root at the joints. Leaves are almost stalkless and hairless. The flowers have white petals and flowers in Spring to Summer, sometimes in late winter.

It smothers native ground covers and can prevent germination of tree species. It is shade tolerant so can establish in healthy forest. It is widespread in higher rainfall areas.

It can reproduce and disperse through seeds and vegetatively, commonly through dumping of garden rubbish.

There are many similar native species *Commelina cyanea*, Scurvy Weed - which has blue flowers and has a denser root system. *Aneilema biflorum*, has smaller, finer leaves and flowers with a finely wavy margin on the leaf.
