Greetings Landcarers

Things are busy at BVL. We have been playing catch up now that COVID restrictions are not so restricting...

Tallowood Ridge Locality Landcare Group got together with the help of Bob Smeuninx from Bushland Restoration Services and Brunswick Valley Landcare to recreate this Themeda Grassland (Kangaroo Grass) along the Tallowood Ridgeline also know as Mooibal Spur.

Many thanks to Dave Rawlins and John Tann for propagating the stock from local provenance Themda; naturally occurring on the Mooibal Spur Ridgeline.

This grassland will become an important and valuable resource to local native wildlife – in particular seed eating bird species and also an area to collect seed to replant other degraded areas where Themeda once naturally occurred.

These grasslands were once wide spread and managed with fire by Indigenous people before white settlement.

Now these grasslands are regarded as endangered ecological communities. The loss of these

grassland communities is a direct result of land clearing, grazing, exotic grass invasion and the absence of fire in the landscape.

The project and planting is funded by the Environmental Trust NSW.

Minyon Falls improvements update

Minyon Falls and Minyon Grass will be closed from 1 March to enable the construction of a new lookout and day use area at Minyon Falls. The site is not expected to reopen until the end of June. **Rummery Park campground will remain open***, accessible via Nightcap Range Road.

The <u>Minyon Falls master plan</u> revised design will deliver an exceptional nature-based visitor experience while minimising impact on the natural setting. The upgrade will improve the sense of arrival, access pathways and family gathering spaces at Minyon Falls, including a new viewing platform, picnic tables and an educational space. The new design will supply opportunities for a diverse range of visitors to understand, enjoy and appreciate parks, and take maximum advantage of the site's interpretive opportunities and scenic values.

Minyon Falls will be closed from 1 March to end June 2021.

Minyon Falls Drive will be closed at Minyon Grass picnic area. See the attached flyer for details.

* Wet weather has delayed the re-opening of the Nightcap Range Road for a few days so there will be a short period when Rummery Park campground is not accessible.

'Our Special Place – Tallow Creek' Exhibition on this Wednesday to Friday

Byron Shire Council is proud to support a unique exhibition created by University of Technology Sydney (UTS) Landscape Architect Masters student Nathan Galluzzo, *Our Special Place – Tallow Creek*, at Byron Bay's Lighthouse Cottage this Wednesday 10 March until Friday 12 March. Admission is free.

The exhibition is a showcase of Nathan's research project which

focusses on using drawings as a measure and means of capturing, recording and delivering stories tied to Tallow Creek, exploring the complexities of ecosystems associated with the ICOLL (intermittent closed and open lake or lagoon) and the significance of the cultural connection of the Arakwal people to the area.

"Nathan has worked closely with two very important people who have an intricate connection to Tallow Creek, incorporating the stories and wisdom of Arakwal leader Uncle Norm and Suffolk Park Dune Care veteran Helen Brown," Council's Coast, Biodiversity and Sustainability Coordinator Chloe Dowsett said.

"Our Special Place – Tallow Creek is a really beautiful and moving exhibition that asks us all to take a moment to consider the stories and beauty of this sacred space from both indigenous and non-indigenous perspectives.

REGENERATIVE AGRICULTURE

WHAT IS REGENERATIVE AGRICULTURE?

Regenerative Agriculture (a.k.a. Regen), works with nature rather than against it. 'Regen' is all about leaving the land better than you found it. Think going beyond organic, it's not a certification (well not yet) but it's an approach to farming that focuses on improving the ecological health of farmland. Regen farmers use a collection of highly adaptable practices, that when performed together, make for healthier, happier soil, food, humans, farmers and planet.

The 'agriculture' part speaks to the farming context. An alternative to conventional, synthetic chemical-fueled practices: Regen is the future. Holistic management keeps



water in the landscape, enriches soil, enhances ecosystem services and increases biodiversity.

Put simply, it is a method of farming that improves the surrounding environment, rather than destroying or depleting it.

Baby fresh water turtles found on Gold Coast beach would not have survived. Currumbin Wildlife Hospital Head Vet Michael Pyne said the turtle "bubs" were likely flushed out of swollen creeks during the recent heavy rain.

"There have been about 10 baby turtles brought in. We've had episodes with heavier flooding in the past where we've had about 30 or 40 turtles brought in within a couple of days after washing up on the beaches," he said.

Funding plans to turn back the tide of extinction

A \$20.3 million Environmental Trust grant to NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service will help turn back the tide of species extinctions by supporting plans to more than triple the area of feral-cat-andfox-free land in national park estate.

Australia has the worst mammal extinction record in the world. In New South Wales, 14 bird species and 26 mammals have become extinct in the past 250 years.

Feral cats and foxes are the key drivers of the decline in most mammals, as well as bird, reptile and amphibian species. Feral cats alone kill more than 1.4 billion native animals each year. In New



South Wales, cats - more than any other feral animal - are thought to impact 117 threatened species.

Weed of the month

Seen this plant? Monkey's comb

Pithecoctenium crucigerum



How does this weed affect us?

Monkey's comb is an aggressive woody climber. It will quickly out-compete and smother other species. This weed:

- impacts on threatened species habitat a.
- slows natural regeneration processes in bushland areas
- restricts the movement of some wildlife

NORTH COAST No Space for Weeds



Where are you likely to find it?

This plant is native to southern Mexico and Brazil. It has been recorded in south-east Queensland and in the North Coast region of NSW.

When looking for this plant, check:

- the edge of bushland areas
- along creek lines
- on road sides

What does it look like?

Monkey's comb is a woody climber with heart shaped leaves. It has hexagonal ribbed branchlets and many-branched tendrils.

Flowers are yellow, tubular and up to 5 cm long and 2 cm wide.

Fruit is a thick woody capsule, with dense prickles. Seeds are surrounded by a transparent wing.
