# GLOSSY BLACK COCKATOO HABITAT ART MEETS HABITAT UPDATE!

Wildbnb in partnership with Brunswick Valley Landcare have been busy installing nest boxes as part of the Glossy black Cockatoo and wildlife safe havens art meets habitat projects. Each hollow has a wildlife camera mounted above so we can see who moves in. The first \$15,000 was used to enact the Glossy Black Cockatoo Habitat project.

Thank you to Santos for the generous \$5000 donation and our generous Chuffed crowd funder donors as well as other supporters of the Wildlife Safe Havens nest box launch the funds raised was used to enact the Glossy Black Cockatoo nest box project in rapid time. There is an urgent need to install boxes as these endangered birds only breed every 2 years and their breeding season is now.

# BYRON SHIRE COUNCIL NEWS 🐌

#### Feedback wanted on Draft Scoping Study for Byron's southern coastline

Byron Shire Council is asking for public feedback on a draft Scoping Study which comprises Stage 1 of the process to develop a Coastal Management Program (CMP) for the coastal area stretching from Cape Byron to Seven Mile Beach including the Tallow Creek and Belongil Creek estuaries.

The areas included in the Scoping Study include:

- · Belongil Creek estuary and catchment
- · Cape Byron Headland Reserve
- · Tallow Beach
- · Tallow Creek estuary and catchment
- · Suffolk Park Beach
- · Broken Head Beach
- · Broken Head Nature Reserve
- Kings Beach
- · Whites Beach
- · Brays Beach
- · Seven Mile Beach

It's the first of several stages necessary in the development of a Coastal Management Program (CMP) for the beaches and coastal areas in the southern part of the shire.

A CMP is a long-term strategy that focuses on the management of the coastal zone taking into account what people value about the beaches, estuaries and coastal areas, what issues are important, current and future threats to the natural environment and how to ensure they are maintained and protected well into the future.

"We surveyed stakeholders and the community at the end of 2020 and they told us the preservation of the natural environment was a primary concern," Chloe Dowsett, Council's Coast, Biodiversity and Sustainability Coordinator, said.

"This will allow Council, in collaboration with public agencies and land managers to develop credible, evidence-based management actions," Ms Dowsett said.

Council understands the community is concerned about erosion on Main Beach but this scoping study is looking at the beaches and estuaries south of the Byron Bay lighthouse and the Belongil estuary.

The Draft Scoping Study for Byron Shire's Southern Beaches is available on the Council website.

The closing date for submissions is 11 June 2021.

Council has already adopted a Scoping Study for the open coastal from Cape Byron to South Golden beach and has commenced Stage 2 of the process with the design and investigation of the Main Beach coastal protection works.

#### "WORLD BEE DAY: NO POLLINATION, NO LIFE"

It is known that 75 percent of the world's crops depend on pollinators. Without them, most of the fruits, flowers, and seeds we know would not exist. The ecosystem service provided by pollination is crucial and immeasurable. However, pollinators are in danger globally due to degenerative agriculture and land management practices. Industrial agriculture that causes loss of habitats due to deforestation, monocultures that threaten biodiversity, the use of pesticides and the resulting climate crisis are the main factors threatening their survival.

An increasingly common phenomenon is hive collapse syndrome, which affects both honey and wild bees, but is even more noticeable in the case of the former.

For beekeepers, the evidence of the collapse is visible when opening the beehive box: there is less and less population and an increasing number of them are uninhabited, as if bees had fled. It is also possible to see worker bees return to the entrance of the hive lost and disoriented, walking in circles, and in some cases not recognizing their own hive.

There are more and more traces of pesticides, in particular neonicotinoids, in pollen and in the hives themselves, which affect their central nervous system, causing disorientation, and weakens their immune system.

#### KNOW A COMMUNITY GROUP THAT COULD USE SOME FUNDING?

Byron Shire Council is inviting local community groups to apply for its pot of annual funding through its Community Initiatives Program – and the **deadline for applications is 11 June, 2021**.

"This year we are very pleased to have **\$44,000** to share across community groups whose activities are located across the Byron Shire," Council's Director Corporate and Community Services, Vanessa Adams said.

"In general, this is split into **\$5,000** grants, plus some smaller grants, that can be awarded to groups with the most pressing needs as well as those starting or wanting to sustain a great community project that can make a real difference to people's lives.

"We've simplified our application process this year to make it easier and to encourage applications from more community groups.

"So if you're involved with or know of a community group that has a particular need, or perhaps they are starting or wanting to sustain a great initiative or project please let them know about this opportunity for some financial assistance," Ms Adams said.

To apply for Council's Community Initiatives Program, community groups need to be an incorporated organisation or auspiced by an incorporated organisation.

# LANDCARE LED BUSHFIRE RECOVERY GRANTS PROGRAM

The Landcare Led Bushfire Recovery Grants will provide eligible local Landcare Groups, environment networks, and community groups with access to grant funding up to \$50,000, and as larger partnerships, projects of up to \$300,000. The funding will support landcare bushfire recovery projects in four government designated bushfire regions in NSW impacted by the Black Summer bushfires of 2019/2020. Applications for grants will remain open until June 16 with successful applicants notified late June.



# WEED OF THE MONTH

#### Freckle face

Hypoestes phyllostachya

Freckle face (Hypoestes phyllostachya) is regarded as an environmental weed in parts of Queensland and New South Wales, and as a "sleeper weed" or potential environmental weed in other parts of Australia.

#### How does this weed affect you?

Freckle face is a garden escape that forms dense infestations in the understory of bushland competing with native plants. It has been found in endangered subtropical rainforests.

#### What does it look like?

Freckle face is a perennial herb with distinctive coloured spots of various sizes on its leaves. It grows up to 1 m tall and has small purple flowers from late summer through winter.

#### Leaves are:

- dark green, with pink, white and/or lilac spots on top
- · pale green underneath
- · oval shaped with pointed tips
- up to 12 cm long and 8 cm wide, gradually get smaller, higher up the stem
- densely covered in long white hairs when young becoming less hairy in older leaves
- · on hairy stalks
- in opposite pairs along the stem.

#### Flowers are:

- purple
- · tube-shaped
- about 2 cm long
- on the upper parts of the stem and grow from the leaf forks.

#### Fruit are:

- · a small hairless capsule
- 8-12 mm long
- green to brownish when ripe
- on the upper parts of the stem and grow from the leaf forks.

#### Seeds:

- 2-3 mm long
- usually 4 per capsule.

#### Stems are:

- · four sided
- branched
- covered in long, white hairs.
