World Rainforest Day (22 June) recognises the importance of healthy rainforests for biodiversity. Rainforests provide critical habitat for around 40% of NSW's threatened species, including this month's Guess Who?

This furry mammal enjoys the dense shrubby areas of rainforests where they can shelter from predators. They emerge from late afternoon to early morning to feed on native grasses and herbs, or sometimes fruit or fungi, therefore restoration and revegetation of forests is vital to protecting this species.

Principal Kylie and P&C President Margie Hall said that the win was a testament to the collaboration of so many and thanked each and every one involved.




Fire Ant Update

A new Biosecurity (fire ants) Emergency Order (No. 6) has been published following fire ant detections in southeast QLD.

NSW DPI has been notified by the National Fire Ant Eradication Program (NFAEP) of confirmed outlying fire ant nests at Currumbin Waters and Meringandan West, QLD. The Currumbin Waters nest is approximately 500m from the NSW border.

Due to its proximity to the border, the nest has triggered the need for movement controls, and will impact some NSW residents. The existing NSW fire ant infested area including Piggabeen and Cobaki will now extend a further 700m into NSW.

Endangered Coastal Emu Protection Project

The 2023/2024 Hawke's Landcare Community Grants supports the 'Endangered Coastal Emu Protection' project in Clarence Valley, NSW. This project aims to increase the coastal emu population by building on the Maclean Lions Club Environmental Group's and Clarence Valley Landcare's efforts in raising community awareness and taking direct action protecting the species. The three-year project focuses on implementing a sustained management program for improved long-term Emu breeding and feral animal control. It engages private landowners, including sugarcane and beef farms and public land managers, to raise awareness of threats to the emu population and control feral pigs, which have a documented impact.

The coastal emu in NSW is classified as an endangered population under the NSW Threatened Species Conservation Act with less than 50 coastal emus having been reported, which are a genetically distinct Emu from western emus. Increased feral pig control in the Taloumbi/Brooms Head area is crucial to reducing the impacts on the coastal emu's breeding cycle, leading to more successful breeding clutches. Reducing feral pig numbers also has a positive environmental outcome by minimising soil disturbance from ground rooting, benefiting both agricultural properties and conservation areas. The emu population in the NSW North Coast Bioregion is of significant conservation value as the last known population in northern coastal NSW. These Emu's also play a vital role in maintaining our native landscape by dispersing large seeds of native plant species over long distances.

Clarence Landcare Program Manager, Debbie Repschlager said, "This is an exciting new project for Clarence Landcare, we get to do what we do best and that is to develop partnerships with organisations and engage the local community to work on ground toward a common goal. In this case, it is for the protection of the Endangered Coastal Emu. We are looking forward to developing our new working relationship with Hawkes Brewing who have engaged us to develop and manage this project. "

The project aims to engage private landholders in raising awareness about threats to the emu population and involve them in controlling feral pigs. Landholders will play a key role in reporting and monitoring feral pigs, setting and checking camera traps, and using bait stations or pig traps. The project will enhance knowledge and communication among landholders regarding feral pig management. Additionally, it seeks to encourage community reporting of pigs through 'FeralScan', a feral animal mapping app. Collaboration between stakeholders, will ensure up-to-date information on the feral pig situation and improve coordination to deliver effective control efforts.

The Threes Rule for Trees

The 'Threes Rule for Trees' is an evidence-based rule of thumb being used by governments, cities, organisations, and communities around the world to improve urban forests in their communities.

In brief:

- 3 large trees in sight,
- 30% neighbourhood canopycover
- No more than 300 metres to a high-quality public green space.

The Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure is proposing changes to the complying development standards for farm buildings, sheds and excavation on rural land.

Let's 'shell-ebrate' freshwater turtles

World Turtle Day was on 23 May. Saving Our Species highlight the role of turtles in the environment, the issues they face, and how we can help ensure they survive into the future.

Turtles and tortoises are an ancient group of reptiles dating back about 220 million years. However, their numbers are declining globally; almost half of the world's 357 turtle species are currently threatened.

New South Wales is home to 7 species of native freshwater turtles. Three are currently listed as threatened.

The Saving our Species program works with project partners and the community to undertake conservation projects to secure a future for these threatened reptiles in the wild.

Why are turtles important?

Freshwater turtles play a critical role in aquatic ecosystems. These turtles:

- maintain ecosystem balance
- contribute to biodiversity
- indicate environmental health
- hold social and cultural value.

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Excitement as 8 more Eastern bristlebirds join the wild ones

To help protect one of Australia's rarest birds, 8 captive-bred eastern bristlebirds were released into the wild to join the critically endangered northern population this year.

This brings the number of captive-bred birds released in the past year to 24. Eastern bristlebirds were once a common sight in southeast Queensland, eastern New South Wales (NSW), and Victoria, but numbers have plummeted to less than 2500 in the wild.

The northern population remains very small, estimated at fewer than 50 individuals living in isolated pockets across the Border Ranges region of north-eastern NSW. Further releases of captive-bred birds will be required to supplement the wild population.

The northern population was counted at just 15 individuals at its lowest point a couple of decades ago. But with long-term habitat restoration work, which is now being delivered through NSW's Saving our Species (SoS) project, the wild population is slowly increasing, with the captive-bred birds providing an extra boost to numbers.

NSW Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water (DCCEEW) is coordinating the bird releases through the SoS program, in partnership with Currumbin Wildlife Sanctuary and private landholders.

Upon release, each bird is fitted with a radio telemetry device for tracking purposes and will be monitored for 30 to 50 days.

Weedscan Update

Australia's first computer-vision weed identification app is five months old and it's growing! Find out how you can support its vital effort.

First developed by CSIRO, the Atlas of Living Australia, the NSW, Queensland, South Australian and Victorian_governments through the Centre for Invasive Species Solutions, with funding from the Australian Government's Landcare Program, this first-generation product includes 450 priority and other weed species linked to State weed management information.

In these early months, WeedScan 1.0 has had over 16,000 downloads and more than 5,000 weed records submitted.

Importantly, our analysis of these records confirms WeedScan's AI model is 85% accurate where its AI Recognition Score is 90% or more. In other words, if the app identifies a weed with 90% confidence or above, its identification is correct 85% of the time.

This is a great result and shows the AI model works well for weeds it knows.

Funding towards a second generation of WeedScan will redress the 15% inaccuracy by adding up to 200 new weeds to the AI model, while also extending the app's usefulness for a broader range of weed species nationwide.

WeedScan 2.0 is also slated for exciting new features for Landcare groups and community, producer or natural resource groups. WeedScan already offers a group function to make it easier and more efficient for group members to record, monitor and coordinate management information.

With WeedScan's original grant now finished, this is your chance to contribute to the app's growth and deployment of AI smarts to tackle Australia's increasing weed burden.

The Centre's Invasive Species Solutions Trust allows tax-deductible donations. Our fundraising target this financial year is \$25,000, which the Centre will match.

WEED OF THE MONTH

Ground asparagus (Asparagus aethiopicus)

Ground asparagus is one of the weeds we'll be focusing on at our Torakina Community Weeding Workshop on Sunday 30th June.

Ground asparagus is a sprawling low-growing shrub with long, prickly stems that grows very densely above the ground and forms thick mats of tubers and roots underground. It is a serious environmental weed because it competes with some threatened native plant species and plants that are within endangered ecological communities and reduces habitat for native animals.

There are some similar looking asparagus weeds including Ming asparagus fern (Asparagus macowanii var. zuluensis) and Foxtail fern (Asparagus densiflorus).

It spreads by seed and by plant parts. Plants can shoot from the crown or parts of the crown. The tubers alone cannot regrow, they are just an energy and water store for the plant. People can spread this weed by dumping garden waste.

We'll be using physical control at the Workshop:

Successful weed control requires follow up after the initial efforts. This means looking for and killing regrowth or new seedlings. Using a combination of control methods is usually more successful.

Physical removal by hand pulling. Very small plants can be hand pulled. Ensure all of the crown is removed. Dispose of the crown and fruit.

Crowning is a technique of digging out the entire crown that sits just below the surface of the soil. The roots and tubers are left in the soil. This helps prevent excessive soil disturbance in sensitive areas, particularly coastal dune environments.

Remove stems and foliage to get access to the crown. Use a sharp knife or trowel to cut all of the roots around the crown just below the surface. Lever the crown out of the ground and dispose of it. Any small segment of the crown that is left behind can regrow.

Dispose - Bag and burn the crown and any fruiting stems including green fruit. Ask your local council for alternative disposal methods.
